"HOLINESS"

Isaiah 6:3

"Aslan is a lion – the lion, the great lion." "Oh" said Susan "I'd thought he was a man. Is he quite safe? I should feel rather nervous meeting a lion."

"Safe?" Said Mr. Beaver "Who said anything about safe? 'Course he isn't safe. But he's good. He's the king, I tell you.'

This exchange between Susan and Mr. Beaver takes place in C.S. Lewis's classic children's book "The Lion, The Witch, and the Wardrobe." In this conversation between Susan and Mr. Beaver, C.S Lewis captures the essence of God's being: greatness and goodness.

God is great and God is good.

These two virtues, greatness and goodness, can be captured by one biblical word. Holv. Holv has two distinct meanings. The first meaning is otherness or apartness and means that God is totally other than the world and man.

In Hosea 11:9 God says "....for I am God and not man, the Holy One in your midst."

Otherness means that God is not in any way to be identified with anything else in all of creation. When we say God is Holy, we call attention to the profound difference between Him and all creatures.

Holy signifies God's total apartness from all that is common and profane, from everything that is unclean or evil.

The second meaning of holy refers to God's pure and righteous actions. God does what is right, he never does what is wrong. God always acts in a righteous manner because his nature is Holy.

His holiness refers to his moral perfection, righteousness and purity.

Isaiah 5:16 says "But the LORD of hosts is exalted in justice, and the Holy God shows himself Holy in righteousness."

God is morally spotless in character and action, upright, pure, and untainted with evil desires, motives, thoughts, words, or acts. He is the source and standard of what Holy Justice. His Righteousness. God's is right. God is free from all evil, he loves truth and goodness. He detests impurity and inauthenticity. God cannot approve of evil, has no pleasure in evil and cannot tolerate evil.

Because God is Holy, he always hates sin and is repulsed by all evil.

When the Bible calls God Holy, it means he is so far above and beyond us that he seems almost totally foreign to us.

In Isaiah 6:3 the seraphim "...were calling to one another 'Holy, Holy, Holy is the LORD Almighty:"

The word holy is repeated three times -Why?

In English we might underline or capitalize to emphasize important words or ideas. Or we might type them in bold or italicize them or highlight them with a marker. In Hebrew literature repetition is used to emphasize importance. For example when Jesus says "Truly, truly I say to you... he is telling his listeners to 'pay attention, what I'm about to say is important.'

Very few times does the Bible repeat something to the third degree. To mention something three times is to assign it "super-importance."

Only once in all of sacred scripture is an attribute of God elevated to the third degree. Only once is a characteristic of God mentioned three times in succession.

The Bible doesn't say that God is merely holy, or even holy, holy. The Bible says that God is *holy*, *holy*, *holy*. The Bible never says that God is justice, justice, justice; or wrath, wrath, wrath; or love, love, love; or mercy, mercy, mercy.

The importance of God's holiness cannot be overstated. Justice, wrath, love and mercy flow from his holiness.

Let's look at just one example of God's total apartness from all that is common. profane, unclean or evil.

In Genesis Abraham pleads with God about Sodom and Gomorrah:

Abraham: "Will you indeed sweep away the righteous with the wicked? Suppose there are fifty righteous within the city.

God: "If I find at Sodom fifty righteous in the city, I will spare the whole place for their sake."

Abraham: "Suppose forty are found there." God: "For the sake of forty I will not do it."

Abraham: "Suppose thirty are found there."

God: "I will not do it, if I find thirty there." Abraham: "Suppose twenty are found there."

God: "For the sake of twenty I will not destroy it."

Abraham: "Suppose ten are found there."

God: "For the sake of ten I will not destroy it."

Then the LORD rained on Sodom and Gomorrah sulfur and fire from the LORD out of heaven.

As I read these stories I find myself conflicted. I find myself questioning God's fairness. I, like Abraham, question God's justice, his righteousness, yes, by default, I am questioning his very character—His Holiness.

When I read of God's justice I realize that I don't fully understand what it means to be holy. I don't fully understand justice, or sin, or grace.

I do understand that God's justice is according to righteousness. There's no such thing as justice according to unrighteousness. The justice of God is always an expression of his holy character.

The word justice in the Bible refers to a conformity to a rule or a norm. God plays by the rules. The ultimate norm of justice

is His own holy character. What God does is always consistent with who God is. He always acts according to his holy character. God's righteousness is rooted in his absolute purity. As a holy God, he is utterly incapable of an unholy, unrighteous, unjust act."

So What? Why does Holiness matter?

- 1) If God is Holy then his acts of wrath, like Sodom and Gomorrah, are righteous actions, they are divine justice.
- 2) If God is Holy, I should fear him. Not because he is mean, but because he is separate, other than, alien, pure, righteous, glorious. His righteousness demands justice. I should fear him because I'm a sinner, and all sin demands punishment.
- 3) "God is to be feared because we have all rebelled against Him. We are his enemies. We are all guilty before Him because of our sins." (TT Jan 2018, p. 21)
- 4) If God is Holy I should fear him because of what Paul writes in Romans chapter 3: "All have turned aside; together they have become worthless; no one does good, not even one."

Why have we become worthless? Because, Paul tells us, "There is no fear of God before their eyes."

The Good News

Let's go back to the conversation between Susan and Mr. Beaver. Susan asks if the Great Lion is safe...

Mr. Beaver says "Safe? Who said anything about safe? "Course he isn't safe. But he's good. He's the king, I tell you."

God is Great and God is Good.

Love and justice, mercy and righteousness meet at the cross. Sin demands a payment. God is Just. He must act according to his character.

It is here, at the cross, that God pours out his wrath and anger upon Jesus Christ. This wrath and anger is meant for me. I've earned it. I deserve it.

Knowing that Jesus took my punishment for my sins and took my place reminds me that God is to be feared because he takes sin seriously. He hates evil, he hates impurity, he is not like me, he is other, he is great, he is Holy. "Were it not for the cross, we too would be consumed by the wrath of God. The very thought of life apart from Christ's cross stirs fear, terror, and awe. While we fear God because of who he is, we need never fear His approach because his wrath and anger toward us have been turned aside at Calvary."

Knowing that "the one who created us in his image is the One who pursued us, lived for us, died for us, rose for us, intercedes for us, and will return for us if we are resting in him" shows me that he is good.

We are members of a New Covenant. "Our inability to obey his commands once condemned us. Now these same commands are written on our hearts. Jeremiah 31:33 says "For this is the covenant that I will make with the house of Israel after those days, declares the LORD: I will put my law within them, and I will write it on their hearts."

We now have a full and final forgiveness of sin. We, who were once God's enemies, are now his friends.

Now What?

God's greatness and goodness, his holiness, gets us here. We have been called, we have answered His call. We are here. Now what?

Paul tells us in 2 Corinthians 7:1 to cleanse ourselves and bring holiness to completion: "Since we have these promises, beloved, let us cleanse ourselves from every defilement of body and spirit, bringing holiness to completion in the fear of God."

In Romans 12:2 Paul tells us to be transformed by renewing our minds: "Do not be conformed to this world, but be transformed by the renewal of your mind, that by testing you may discern what is the will of God, what is good and acceptable and perfect."

Burk Parsons says the gospel is the difference between being afraid of God and fearing God. It's only when we come to fear the Lord that the Lord tells us to fear not. For when we know the love of God in Christ, the Spirit casts out all fear and instills in us love and adoration, that we might work out our salvation with fear and trembling and worship the Lord before his face with reverence and awe.

Trust

On September 14, 1860, Charles Blondin became the first person to cross a tightrope stretched 11,000 feet across the mighty Niagara Falls.

He walked across, 160 feet above the falls, many times... each time with a different daring feat - once in a sack, on stilts, on a bicycle, even blindfolded.

Each time he walked across he asked the crowd, "Do you believe I can make it across?"

The crowd would answer by shouting in unison: "Yes, we believe, we believe!"

Excitement ran along both sides of the river bank. The crowd "Oohed and Aahed!" as Blondin carefully walked across—one dangerous step after another— pushing a wheelbarrow holding a sack of potatoes.

The applause was deafening.

Blondin held up his hand to quiet the crowd then asked: "Do you believe I can carry a person across in this wheelbarrow?"

The crowd enthusiastically yelled, "Yes! Yes! We believe!"

Blondin grinned, slapped his hands together and said, "Great! Who wants to go first?"

Finally

In Luke 12:32 Jesus says this: "Fear not, little flock, for it is your Father's good pleasure to give you the kingdom."

Wow! The Holy God that we meet in scripture—and only that God— is the Shepherd who seeks us, the Father who adopts us, and the King who loves us."

To paraphrase Mr. Beaver:

"Aslan is a lion – the lion, the great lion. Yes he's good, he's the King I tell you."
