Do we need scholars to understand the Scriptures?

I was listening to a podcast recently, and this question was asked in regard to understanding the Scriptures. My first response was a resounding, "No!" "Absolutely not!" I then had to rethink my answer. I suppose it depends on at what point are we considering the Scriptures?

I am confident most of you know the Scriptures were originally written in languages that most of us know little to nothing about. The Old Testament was written in Hebrew, the New Testament was written in Classic Greek (as opposed to modern Greek) and a few chapters were written in Chaldean, the language of ancient Babylon. (No, the apostle Paul did not write his letters in the original King James English nor in Klingon as some would like to assume.)

Personally, I know of no one who speaks any of these languages fluently. Yes, some might know very small scraps of them, but just enough to be dangerous. In other words, we must depend on ancient language scholars who were and are able to translate the original writings into a language we can understand. This is a fact we cannot deny.

I am convinced it was never the Lord's will that people learn a new language in order to be able to read and understand His Word. There was a time in our recent history that some, by requiring everyone read the Old King James only, did require we learn a new language. The Old KJV had become so archaic that it truly was a foreign and new language for many.

It is for this reason we should be grateful that beginning in the 12th century, many did make great efforts to translate the Scriptures from their original languages to what has become the modern languages of today.

For most of you reading this, this is English. English is by far the most common language spoken in our society. And there are a growing number of Spanish speaking people as well with many other less popular languages such as the oriental languages as well as French and Italian mixed in to various amounts as well as many others.

The point is, we all must depend on the work of ancient language scholars in order to read God's Word today.

Many of these scholars gave their lives in order that we might have God's Word in languages we can readily understand. During the Dark Ages, the established religion of those times fought against all efforts working to get the Word of God into the hands of the common man in his native language.

With all of this said, I am confident the Lord has used these scholars to do this great work.

With these things in mind, I am convinced the Lord intended for the average person to be able to read and comprehend His Word without the help of what has become modern scholarship.

Once we have the Scriptures in languages we can read and comprehend, we do not require that others necessarily explain them to us. We now have it within our capacity to understand God's word on our own.

The Lord gave us these Scriptures for just this purpose. This is certainly not to say we are not benefitted by those teachers among the Lord's body, for we certainly are. However, it is still within most of our ability to read and comprehend God's Word for ourselves.

It is for this reason we will be held accountable before our Creator if we are deceived by others who may teach these Scriptures falsely. We must be like the Bereans in Acts 17:10-15, for they heard what Paul was teaching, and they searched the Scriptures for themselves to make sure his teaching was truly according to God's Truths and accurate.

It is also interesting to note that Jesus went to the common man with His messages. He did not speak to them in languages that were above their understanding, with words they could not grasp. This is one of the reasons why some were amazed that He spoke with authority and sure knowledge.

These same Scriptures follow the same pattern. Yes, we depended on others to translate them in languages we could understand, but once this has been accomplished, we are responsible for what we have.

It is my conviction the Lord has used the many excellent translations, even within English, to give us confidence that what we have is what the Lord intended we have in His Providence, if not His actual miraculous hand, (which I do not necessarily discount).

We have the promise expressed in Isaiah 40:7-8 7.

"The grass withers,
the flower fades,
because the breath of the LORD
blows upon it;
Surely the people are grass.
The grass withers,


