The Imperfect Saints of Faith

"By faith the walls of Jericho fell down after they were encircled for seven days. By faith the harlot Rahab did not perish with those who did not believe, when she had received the spies with peace.

"And what more shall I say?

"For the time would fail me to tell of Gideon and Barak and Samson and Jephthah, also of David and Samuel and the prophets; who through faith subdued kingdoms, worked righteousness, obtained promises, stopped the mouths of lions, quenched the violence of fire, escaped the edge of the sword, out of weakness were made strong, became valiant in battle, turned to flight the armies of the aliens."

~ Hebrews 11:30-34

Hebrews 11 is called by many, "The Hall of Faith", and for good reason.

It is filled with the great deeds of many saints of old. Saints who had much faith. Saints the Lord used in inspiring ways for various purposes.

It starts with Abel and commences to review much of Israel's history. It speaks of Enoch, Abraham, Moses, and many others. The Lord used these individuals to bring about His plans of hope and purpose for the Lord's people to follow.

This chapter includes great works such as saving mankind from thier own sin as well as bringing forth a nation that would bring the Christ and the Old Testament to the world.

It speaks of how the Lord used a harlot who had faith enough to help Israel begin its conquest of Canaan.

Take special note of verses 30-33. Something that stands out in my mind is that, though these men and woman had great faith, they also had great imperfections.

In particular, I think of Barak, Samson and Jephthah.

Barak seemed to refuse to do what the Lord called him to do as told in Judges 4:6-8—unless it was with a condition that he "required."

Jephthah was the son of a harlot, though that certainly was not his fault. However, it is worthy of note that according to Judges 11:3, when he was chased away from his family, "worthless men" joined him in raiding. I wonder why he attracted such men and even associated with them?

However later in the chapter, the Spirit of the Lord came upon him and helped him win Israel's freedom from the Canaanites.

Hebrews 11 reminds us of Samson, for yes, he too was a man of faith according to the Holy Spirit, yet in reading Judges 13-14, we learn he also had some great imperfections. In particular he had serious weaknesses in regard to the women he was attracted to. In spite of these imperfections, the Lord recognized him as having great faith!

This should give us hope. Why?

We, as the Lord's Christians, also are imperfect saints. We all battle with our own weaknesses and imperfections. Many of us share some of the same weaknesses these Old Testament saints had.

If you do not have these same weaknesses, you certainly have your own that you must deal with. And sometimes our weaknesses get the better of us, as they did in these examples. Sometimes we simply fail just as they did.

Nevertheless, notice the successful victories they accomplished through their faith.

- · They subdued kingdoms.
- They worked righteousness.
- They obtained promises.
- They stopped the mouths of lions.
- Out of weaknesses they were made strong!

This is the kind of victories that came about due to their weaknesses that the Lord assured the apostle Paul of in 2 Corinthians 12:9-10:

"And He said to me, 'My grace is sufficient for you, for My strength is made perfect in weakness.'

"Therefore most gladly I will rather boast in my infirmities, that the power of Christ may rest upon me. Therefore I take pleasure in infirmities, in reproaches, in needs, in persecutions, in distresses, for Christ's sake. For when I am weak, then I am strong."

With all of this said, it can harm our spirits when we constantly worry that God will reject us because we are imperfect beings. In reality, He works with our weaknesses to make us stronger and to ultimately work toward righteousness.

Of course, I am talking about learning and growing when we recognize we are imperfect beings, when we repent of our wrongdoings, and we continue to go forward through faith. The same faith these imperfect people had.

Our faith can be just as powerful and just as effective in helping us grow more and more in our striving to do our Father's will and to be more like Jesus, which should be our ultimate goal.




Heartfelt Love & Prayers:

There are two solstices every year:

There is one in December and one in June. The December solstice marks the shortest day north of the equator and the longest day in the south.

In Des Moines, Iowa, the winter solstice falls on Wednesday, December 21, 2022 at 3:48 pm CST.

The December solstice can be on December 20, 21, 22, or 23.

December 21 or 22 solstices happen more often than December 20 and 23 solstices. The last December 23 solstice was in 1903 and the next one is in 2303. A December 20 solstice is also rare, with the next one in the year 2080.

Why Does the Date Vary?

Today's Gregorian calendar has 365 days in a common year and 366 days in a leap year. However, our planet takes about 365.242199 days to orbit the Sun. This means that the timing of the equinoxes and solstices slowly drifts apart from the Gregorian calendar, and the solstice happens about 6 hours later each year. Eventually, the accumulated lag becomes so large that it falls on the following date.

A Specific Point in Time

Most people count the whole day as the December solstice. However, the solstice is actually at a specific moment - when the Sun is exactly overhead the Tropic of Capricorn.

Shortest Day in the North

Since the Northern Hemisphere is tilted away from the Sun in December, it receives less sunlight during the course of a day. At the solstice, the North Pole's tilt away from the Sun is greatest, so this event marks the shortest day of the year north of the equator.

The Sur 'Stands Still'

The term solstice comes from the Latin word solstitium, meaning 'the Sun stands still.' This is because on this day, the Sun reaches its southern-most position as seen from the Earth. The Sun seems to stand still at the Tropic of Capricorn and then reverses its direction. It's also common to call it the day the Sun turns around.

It's the First Day of Astronomical Winter

In the Northern Hemisphere, astronomers and scientists use the December solstice as the start of the winter season, which ends on the March equinox. For meteorologists, on the other hand, winter begins three weeks earlier, on December 1.
